Speech by Honourable Zou Kota-Fredericks (MP), Minister for the Department of Human Settlements in South Africa on the occasion of the 2016 All Africa Public Sector Innovation Awards (AAPSIA) in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, 9 December 2016

I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate all the 2016 AAPSIA finalists. Personally I am particularly humbled by the high quality projects that were entered in this year's competition. The quality of your work, in terms of its innovative nature as well as its replicability and sustainability is impeccably unparalleled hence your presence here.
